

In 2013 we received an invitation to attend the In those 12 years we have supported over 4 River Festival in Karlovac Croatia, this was the start of our international journey which brought many award winning international short films made by young people to Wales and provided many opportunities to introduce Wales it's culture and its films to new audiences all over the world.

We were one of 15 festivals to sign a memorandum of understanding to work together. 12 years later the YCN covers 5 continents and has 58 members including 31 festivals, 13 organisations and 14 freelancers

100 trainers and young volunteers from Wales with an international experience and welcomed over 100 international guests, festival directors and young filmmakers to our festival in Wales.

The annual Youth Cinema Network YCN award recognizes excellent in film made by young people from all over the world, this was established in 2016 with the first award being presented in Wales at the Wicked Wales Festival at Bodelwyddan Castle.




WW Studios: Supporting Creative Talent in North Wales

Our vision for WW Studios is to support and encourage young people in North Wales to gain the experience and knowledge necessary to advance in the creative industries. Our core aim is to deliver accessible training within a supportive community setting in this region.











The studio garden

When we opened our new cultural centre/film studios in Rhyl in 2024 we wanted to make a difference to the local community. As we transformed what was a garage into an exciting new media space, when we stopped for a cuppa and sat outside we were faced with an empty little area of soil, a small storage area and 4 car parking spaces.

Our aim was to make a green space with flowers and new habitats for birds, bees, bugs and other insects. A place for people to relax, for passers-by to enjoy and for dogs to have a drink.

We have evergreen perennials alongside pretty weeds, a mobile orchard, a pond and pick your own herb garden. We recycle when we can and our plant stakes include tripods and a music stand.



Our studio space




Congratulations Andrew!

He had recently published his first book 'Twelve Doors' in 2023 and was looking to make a short film as the first step leading onto a feature film or series. Les, an ex firefighter and policeman, wanted to celebrate the role of the 19,000 on-call firefighters in the UK. For each call, twelve ordinary men and women, bound by duty, drop everything and risk their lives to save others. His book is dedicated to these brave men and women who are part of a special family of emergency service staff. The book was launched on Amazon and is receiving some great reviews.

Les says "The pager goes and they go in as one person and out as another, twelve brave people looking out for each other. We are very grateful for all the support and advice we have received from the North Wales Fire and Rescue Service, whose help is making this film possible, we hope the film will make them proud"

The film script was developed by Robert A-Wood who is also the director of the short film. After receiving over 100 applicants for the cast and crew, roles for "The White Helmet" all positions are now filled and filled with talent from North Wales.

Head of Studios Andrew Virgo says "We are very proud and delighted that Les has chosen Wicked Wales Studios in Marsh Road Rhyl to produce his first film based on his book, particularly as the locations for the film will be in the West End of Rhyl and feature many streets known to the local community"

David Baker Photographer: The Reso - Through Our Eyes 💙



David Baker is a photographer whose creative journey began after experiencing a traumatic brain injury in a cycling accident in 2016. During his rehabilitation, he was introduced to phototherapy, which provided him with a new direction in both his life and artistic development. He earned a BA (Hons) in Commercial Photography with First Class Honours, graduating in 2023, and is now studying for a Master's degree at the Arts University Bournemouth.

His interest lies in socially engaged, documentary-led projects focusing on marginalised Welsh communities. His practice is exemplified by long-term projects, such as Rhyl People, a portrait initiative that offers free printed photographs to residents of the deprived coastal town of Rhyl. (www.rhylpeople.com)

In 2026, David will collaborate with Wicked Wales Studios on a participatory photography project that gives a voice to residents, past and present, of a workingclass housing estate situated close to the Studios in Rhyl, North Wales, known locally as the 'Reso'. The nickname 'Reso' derives from the term 'Reservation,' highlighting the estate's isolation, as outsiders perceive it as separate from the wider town. The project will explore what it means to live in a marginalised community.

The estate provides social housing in an area that ranks high on deprivation indexes, which measure unemployment, poverty, crime, and poor health. Despite this inequality, the 'Reso' has consistently demonstrated strength and community solidarity. This project will empower a multi-generational community, allowing them to share their stories through participatory engagement.

Through the memories of older residents, the project will explore their recollections of place and identity. Photography workshops with younger generations will allow them to document their lives and surroundings, complemented by a documentary photographer's lens as David returns to his

This project aims to amplify the voices of the Reso. Ultimately, this initiative intends to reaffirm the Reso as a place of memory, identity, and resilience, creating a lasting cultural record shaped by and for its community.
